THE DON DORRIGO, GUY FAWKES AND COFF'S HARBOUR

Coff's Harbour Advocate Tuesday 18 February 1908 Written by Surveyor J. O. Burgess

"Sir, - It is upward of 28 years since I first visited the above localities in pursuance of my duties as a Staff Surveyor in the district of Grafton, then under Mr District Surveyor Donaldson. It may be noticed that I am using the name Don Dorrigo. In 1880 Mr. Oliver Trickett, now Surveyor and officer-in-charge of the Jenolan Caves, surveyed the country boundary from the Guy Fawkes to the Clarence River, and in 1881 I relieved him and continued the survey of the Dividing Range north to Queensland border, near Mt Lindesay, and was fortunate in securing Mr Trickett's pack-horses, which had already been broken in to rough country.

"Through Mr Trickett I first heard of the **Guy Fawkes**, and in the latter end of the 1880s, on personally visiting the district, at once became greatly attracted with this beautiful land of running streams and waterfalls, situated in a temperate climate only 70 miles from the semitropics of the northern rivers.

"The most difficult work I had on the **Don Dorrigo** was the survey of the Dividing Range from the Bald-hills run to Tucker's Nob, at an average height from 4000 to 2000 feet, through a continuous thick forest scrub for a distance of 50 miles. To do this we could only establish three main camps, one on **Meinhard**'s selection above Dangar's or Beilsdown Falls, the next down on the Bellinger, on **Mrs McFadyen's** selection under **Tucker's Nob**, and the last up at the head of the Deer park. There was no road made then. A 4ft bridle track had been cut, but hearing it was partly washed away and obstructed by fallen timber, we never attempted to use it, so had no alternative but to get up and down what was well known then as the Ferny Face, a portion of steep descent of 2400 feet to the Bellinger.

"And now for **Woolgoolga and Coff's Harbour**, the designing and naming of streets of which was entrusted to me, it is generally desirable to have a record as to why the names were originally appropriated. At **Woolgoolga** the names of the streets almost speak for themselves. **Nightingale -street**, after Florence Nightingale, being adjacent to the proposed hospital site; **Gordon-street**, after General Gordon; **Scarborough**, and **Hastings**, after English seaside resorts.

"In June1893, I was engaged with an extended design down to the Jetty, and in that month telegrams reached Australia announcing the collision between Her Majesty's ships 'Victoria' and 'Camperdown' of the Mediterranean Fleet, with the total loss of the 'Victoria', Admiral Tryon, and 358 officers and men. They were in the fleet of eight battle ships and five cruisers, so I conceived the idea of naming the streets of a rising Seaport after some of those ships.

"So as the Town Map will show streets were named after the following ships — Victoria, Camperdown, Nile, Collingwood, Edinburgh and Edgar streets. Orlando Street was named after the flagship of the Australian station at that time. Mildura and Katoomba streets were ships of the Australian auxiliary squadron. Hood and Nelson streets were other ships of Her Majesty. And to perpetuate my own memories, Salamander and Curacoa, were ships in which I served on the Australian station in the 1860s."(Sic)

- * East Perth Cemeteries: Friends of Battye Library and National Trust of Western Australia have launched an upgraded website for the East Perth Cemeteries. - * Cornish Association of NSW: There are many Cornish people working or retired in Australia and up to 2% in the State of NSW have strong Cornish ancestry which started in 1788 with the arrival of convict James Ruse and his countrymen on the First Fleet. The CANSW follows an earlier association in the late 1880s which lasted well past the 1920s, with some existence known until the 1950s. The modern CANSW was formed by post-WWII Cornish immigrants for social and cultural activities but soon gained many members of Cornish descent (up to the 6th generation). CHDFHS Society Members, Joy and Chris Dunkerley (who joined towards the end of 2018) are President and Treasurer of the Association. - * Tracing London Convicts in Britain & Australia, 1780-1925: The resources on this British website are vast and it is impossible to describe all that you might find. Millions of searchable records from 50 datasets contain information on the lives of 90,000 convicts from the Old Bailey sentenced to transportation or imprisonment. The records are divided into 6 categories: Trial Records; Post-Trial and Sentencing Records; Transportation Records; Colony Records; Civil Records; and Imprisonment Records. In some cases, the data can be viewed directly on the website, in other cases the search directs you to datasets that can be accessed on subscription websites such as Findmypast. Go to the site at: https://www.digitalpanopticon.org/
- * Scottish Indexes: This website at https://scottishindexes.com/ has added over 133,000 Scottish High Court records to their website. The High Court in Scotland was responsible for hearing everything from serious criminal cases (such as murder and treason) to cases of repeat offenders for less serious crimes. The information held in each record in this collection varies greatly depending on the crime and the circumstances. One nice thing about criminal records is that they often contain a great deal of information not often found in an ancestral record, but which is of interest to genealogists, e.g. many criminal records contain detailed physical descriptions and photographs of the accused. The records in this collection can be searched by first name, last name, occupation, residence, year of birth and court/prison. Access is free.
- * FamilySearch has added many new records and images as well as indexing additional records including Historic German Lutheran Church Records 1500-1971 (in partnership with Ancestry) and Ireland 1901 Census Records (another 900,000 records added).

SUBSCRIPTION SITES: Our Society has subscriptions to Ancestry, Findmypast and The Genealogist as well as BDA and BNA and we are an Affiliated Library of FamilySearch.

- * Ancestry has updated or added many collections including Australian Convict Transportation Registers Other Fleets & Ships 1791-1868.
- * FindmyPast additions include Ancient English Marriage License Records dating back as far as 1115 for 15 different counties incl. London, Lancashire, Suffolk, Exeter, Lincoln and Yorkshire; and Cheshire.

REMEMBER to keep re-checking sites you have searched before as most are constantly adding new records especially the free National Library of Australia website (incl. Trove) and also The Ryerson Index. All links were checked and valid on 5 February 2019.




